Shoreline Management Plans are high level, non-statutory policy documents for coastal defence management planning.


Set out a **100** year direction of travel for sustainable coastal management for policy units along a coastal frontage, based on sediment cells.

Any scheme or coastal works are expected to be in accordance with the relevant SMP in order to be considered for approval and funding.

They do not guarantee funding or delivery of schemes

SMP's consider:

- Coastal processes
- Coastal defences
- Land use
- Human and built environments
- Natural environments
- Climate change






SMP 1

- Based on sediment cells and sub-cells
- 1995 to 2000 39
 SMP1s developed covering England and Wales
- Set policy for 50 year planning horizon
- 4 policies:
 - Do nothing
 - Hold the existing defence line
 - Advance the existing defence line
 - Retreat the existing defence line





SMP₂



- 2000 to 2011 22 SMP2s
 developed covering England and Wales
- Set policy for 100 year planning horizon
- 3 epochs (0-20 years; 20-50 years; 50-100 years)
- 4 policies:
 - No active intervention
 - Hold the line
 - Advance the line
 - Managed realignment
- Action Plan



SMP Refresh - Why?




SMPs remain sound documents outlining the 'most appropriate thing' to do at the shoreline

However ...

- SMP policies are not applied consistently around the country
- Deliverability of policy in some areas is questionable
- Epoch boundaries are perceived to be rigid "points of change" whereas in reality they are "fuzzy" boundaries.
- There has been a lack of progress on adaptation planning or implementation to prepare for SMP policy transitions
- Since 2011, things have changed:
 - New guidance (eg climate change)
 - New legislation & environmental designations
 - Changes in coastal evolution/management
 - More comprehensive monitoring data
 - New coastal strategies and schemes

- We are now coming towards end of 1st epoch are we 'epoch 2 ready'?
 - Where are we now?
 - Where are we trying to get to?
 - How will we get there?



SMP Refresh - What?



Aims of the SMP Refresh:

- Provide guidance on how SMPs can incorporate new knowledge, legislation etc.
- Improve overall quality, deliverability, and consistent application of key principles across SMPs, but recognising local nuances
- Ensure SMPs remain technically robust but adaptable to future change
- Promote the principle that SMPs should be 'living' and provide a clearly defined route-map with actions to be 'epoch-2 ready' and enable delivery of the policies over the coming decades.

This is <u>not SMP3</u> and it will not change policies, short cut the SMP policy change process or take away any local ownership or decisions on SMPs.

SMP Refresh Framework:

- Is not a fundamental appraisal of SMP management policies
- Will help the SMP move forward and evolve within the delivery framework
- Combine epochs with management triggers to clarify timing of policy transitions and keep SMP 'live'

Measure 2.1.3: From 2020 the Environment Agency and coast protection authorities will advise planning authorities on how SMPs can better inform planning policies for the coast, including designation of coastal change management areas
